SUPPORT

A core aim of the RCOBA is to **Contribute financially** to the well-being of the school. In recent years the Association has supported teams and individual students to attend national and international sports and cultural events. We were pleased to assist Year 13 student, **Samuel Ropati**, to attend a two-week workshop in July at the world renowned Palace Dance Academy in Auckland, which was established by Parris Goebel. Goebel has choreographed award winning dance video and stage



shows for several international music performers, including Justin Bieber, Rihanna, Janet Jackson, Jennifer Lopez, and Nicki Minaj and was appointed by the Prime Minister as NZ's cultural and entertainment curator for the 2020 Dubai World Expo. The Palace is regarded as one of the finest hip-hop dance studios in the world.

Sam has ambitions to work professionally in the dance and entertainment sector and the opportunity to receive further tutoring at the Palace and to meet leading choreographers was undoubtedly exciting but also expensive in terms of travel to Auckland. A small donation from the

Association provided the extra funds required to assist Sam's family to secure his return tickets, for which he was most grateful. Sam provided a thorough report of his experiences at the workshop, abridged excerpts below:

The Palace Dance Studio & My Experience

On Monday July 9th 2019, I set foot in the creative space of The Palace Dance Studio. Being at the course and learning about the history of dance and designs, gave me more inspiration and creative ideas on what I wanted and needed to do to realise my dreams. On the day before our final assignment we had to teach our routines to the other students in the class. When I told everyone to take a two -minute water break, I then saw Parris Goebel in the corner of my eye and straight away I told everyone, "water break is over" and everyone rushed to their spots, knowing that Parris was watching. As I taught the crew, her dad (co-owner of The Palace) showed up and they were both intrigued. When my session finished one of the students told me that they heard Paris talking with my mentor instructor, Elvis, and he told me that they were talking about me!

Parris: "I really like his set. He should definitely audition next year!"

I was so excited but I didn't want to show it nor tell anyone else how I was feeling. On the last day of the course I had to teach one of the crews from The Palace for my assignment. I was extremely nervous but also thrilled to teach the Sorority Dance Crew, as I have watched their amazing journey for years and always admired their spectacular creative dance routines at performances, gigs and also at competitions where I would actually be competing against them. After teaching them, several dancers came up to me and told me I should audition for a crew next year, they gave me compliments such as "you're confident, talented and fierce."



Without the help of Rongotai College Staff and the Old Boys Association, I wouldn't have met so many inspiring people and students through the two weeks I was in Auckland. So, next year I'll be auditioning for the Royal Family crew and hopefully I will earn a place in their team!

James Hunter Outward Bound Scholarship

This fund was established in 2018 by the family of James Hunter, following his sudden death in 2017. With the very generous financial support of Old Boys, alongside matching sponsorship from local Tommy's real estate agent, Ben Terry, we have thus far helped five students attend Outward Bound courses, with two more scheduled to go in December. The following reports from students indicate just how valuable they have found the experience to their personal growth.



Dean Banks, attended his course in May, 2019: I had the amazing opportunity to go to Outward Bound at the start of 2019, to start with it was simply a beautiful place to spend 21 days, located in the middle of the Marlborough Sounds, the views are always fantastic, full of natural beauty, both on the sea and the land. There were also 13 new and amazing people to meet and hang out with. It's a great basis for friendship and trust, getting to know and having amazing experiences with, the unlikely crew that you are put together

with. The opportunities I had were fantastic: I climbed a 2100m mountain; paddled along in a waka ama; learned to sail and captain a boat. It also made me much more confident in myself and my leadership ability, I was now able to put my ideas out there without fearing a response, listening instead to critical feedback offered by trusted instructors and allies. My perspective had changed, and now I felt secure in myself, ready to take on real life, outside of Outward Bound's bubble. If anyone reading this gets the opportunity to get that Outward Bound experience, I strongly recommend that they go for it. This is something that you shouldn't pass up, and especially with the Rongotai scholarship available at school.
